The possibility of needing assistance and care later in life is one that many of us would prefer not to discuss. It is easier to think, "I won't get sick, it won't happen to me." The reality is that more than 70 percent of Californians age 65 and over will need some kind of long-term care. In California, the average cost of a one-year stay in a nursing home is \$91,250, an amount that is growing approximately five percent annually.

When it comes to financial planning, determining how to pay for long-term care is often the last item that families address, even though it may be the most important. Failure to plan for long-term care needs, however, can be financially devastating.

To help Californians receive the care they may need, the State of California created a public-private partnership with select insurance companies. The California Partnership for Long-Term Care offers State-approved private insurance policies. These policies include enhanced consumer protection features to encourage your consideration of long-term care insurance.

Long-term care insurance covers not only the cost of care in a nursing home, but also care at home, in a residential care facility or in other home and community-based settings. Partnership long-term care insurance policies are designed to provide you with options to ensure your independence when you need it most.

Only specially trained and licensed long-term care insurance agents are permitted to offer these Partnership long-term care insurance policies. These agents are waiting to respond to your questions, but they will receive your name <u>only if you request</u> more information by completing the attached card. There are many available options. I encourage you to talk with an agent to discuss the best choice for you and your family.

Most of us have fire insurance on our homes, even though only 1 out of 1000 home owners will ever have a serious fire. Consider that 700 out of 1000 of us over the age of 65 will need some type of long-term care.
